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BIOGRAPHY

David Amos has made it his specialty as an orchestral conductor to introduce to the public lesser known works of composers worthy of greater recognition, as well as more obscure music of famous composers. To this end, Mr. Amos has commissioned new works as well as conducted many world premiere performances in concert and in recordings.

His musical training includes two degrees from San Diego State University, and Doctoral studies in conducting at Indiana University. He has conducted and recorded over 150 compositions on more than thirty two compact discs. Only five of these works are from the familiar standard repertory. In these recordings, he conducted orchestras such as the London Symphony Orchestra, the Israel Philharmonic, The Royal Philharmonic, the Polish National Radio Orchestra, the Slovak Radio Symphony, the Slovak State Philharmonic, The New Russia Orchestra, The Philharmonia, and the Jerusalem Symphony.

Recently, he has given hour long interviews on Kol Israel Radio and Boston's WGBH.

His latest album of world premiere recordings of the music of Achron, Bloch, and Saminsky with pianist Barry Goldsmith and the Royal Scottish National Orchestra was released in the Spring of 2005,

In addition to having hosted and produced a contemporary music series on radio for four years, David Amos is the music columnist for the news magazine San Diego Jewish Times, the conductor of the TICO Orchestra, which he has led for thirty two years, and is in frequent demand as a lecturer, guest conductor, and adjudicator in music competitions. He is a volunteer with XLLC1 Classical Radio, and has various ongoing projects with the Orquesta de Baja California.

Gerard Schwartz and Leonard Slatkin are usually the two conductors acknowledged as the leaders in performing and recording the classical music of the middle years of the Twentieth Century—particularly American Music. But, there is another conductor who is also very active in the same areas, albeit out of the public spotlight. His name is David Amos. He is headquartered in San Diego, and over the years and for several record companies has compiled a truly impressive catalog of recordings. Together with the London Symphony Orchestra, these are

D. Amos has over 30 commercial CD albums which have been released worldwide with labels such as Harmonia Mundi, Vox, Naxos, Helicon, Crystal, and Koch. In these recordings, he has conducted some of the orchestras listed above. As of this time, they include over 150 compositions, with only three of them

from the standard repertory. A complete listing is attached to this dossier, including a few critical comments from the world press, and observations from the living composers whose works were recorded.

David Amos founded in 1974 what was formerly the San Diego Jewish Community Center Orchestra, and is now the Tifereth Israel Community Orchestra (TICO). This dynamic organization, is in its 34th year, and continues to present innovative programs, combining the traditional repertory with new music. Many renowned soloists have performed with TICO, including distinguished San Diego musicians and principal players from orchestras such as the Toronto Symphony, Israel Philharmonic, and Los Angeles Philharmonic. TICO has also commissioned dozens of new works and has presented many world premieres of prestigious composers.

D. Amos has lectured on various musical subjects, and specifically on Twentieth Century American Orchestral music in various venues in San Diego, and also at Hebrew University in Jerusalem, at Bar-Ilan University in Israel, to the American Symphony Orchestra League in New York, and to the Association of California Symphony Orchestras in Sacramento. He has also given pre-concert lectures for the San Diego Symphony and the La Jolla (Chamber) Music Society, including its SummerFest Series. In 1997, he gave a lecture-recital on Israeli Music at the HED Music Festival in Yahud, Israel.
